Interview With The Executive Director

No vampires were involved in the making of this article.



Q: Many residents know your name, but not everyone knows your story. How did you end up at MHRA?

I joined MHRA in 2021, and it has been an incredible journey. After spending 10 years in Human Resources, I came to MHRA as the Human Resources Director and expected to continue in that role. Then, after our former Executive Director announced her retirement, the Board approached me about becoming the next Executive Director. I was shocked, nervous, and incredibly excited for the opportunity. It has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my career.

Q: What is something residents would be surprised to learn about the work MHRA does every day?

If we could clone ourselves to have extra hands on deck, we would! While each resident may interact regularly with just one or two MHRA employees, it takes an entire team working behind the scenes to serve nearly 6,000 residents throughout Manchester. Our maintenance staff alone complete thousands of work orders each year, and every department plays an important role in keeping our communities running. Providing affordable housing is about so much more than putting a roof over someone's head—it takes teamwork, dedication, and a tremendous amount of effort every single day.

Q: What are you most excited about at MHRA right now?

Community partnerships. I like to think every Executive Director has the opportunity to define their legacy. For me, it's about building meaningful partnerships with local organizations that expand opportunities for our residents. Whether it's education, employment, healthcare, financial literacy, or youth programs, I believe MHRA is uniquely positioned to connect residents with the resources they need to thrive. I am all for upward mobility.

Q: What do you wish more residents knew about living in public housing?

Maintaining affordable housing takes an incredible amount of work—and funding. Unfortunately, federal funding for public housing continues to decline while the cost of maintaining our buildings continues to rise. Every dollar we receive is carefully stretched to keep our communities well-maintained and operating for the thousands of residents who call them home.

Q: What are some goals or projects residents can look forward to in the coming year?

Residents can expect to see more information about community resources and opportunities available to them. Our Resident Services team is growing and expanding its efforts to connect residents with programs and services that can make a meaningful difference in their daily lives.

Q: If you could clear up one common misconception about MHRA, what would it be?

Many people assume MHRA is owned or operated by the City of Manchester or the State of New Hampshire. In reality, MHRA is an independent public housing authority governed by its own Board of Commissioners and primarily funded through federal programs administered by HUD.

Q: Coffee, tea, or energy drinks?

Coffee... and probably more cups a day than I should admit.

Q: What was your very first job?

I started out washing dishes at a restaurant. One day, the head cook noticed I had memorized how the meals were prepared and how orders moved through the kitchen. He asked me to step onto the line and start cooking instead. I said yes.

Q: What is one thing people would never guess about you?

I grew up in a low-income household with just my mom, my brother, and me. For a long period of time, we didn't have a car, and I remember my mom walking to and from the grocery store in every kind of weather. In middle school, I desperately wanted to fit in with classmates who came from more affluent families. One day, I saved enough money to buy an American Eagle shirt, which was the brand to wear at the time. I wore that shirt every other day because it was all I had that made me feel like I belonged. Instead, I was bullied for wearing it so often. People always mention how calm I am, I guess tough experiences made me more grounded!

Q: If you weren't working in housing, what do you think you'd be doing?

I would probably still be working in Human Resources because I've always enjoyed working with and supporting people. If I were to choose a completely different path, though, it would likely involve working with children.

maintenance corner

We wanted to help give a bit more information regarding creating Online Tenant Portal Work Orders and the Work Order Phonenumber. These are some clarifying tips to help you and the maintenance staff better assist your unit repairs and needs.



1. How to use the Portal

Online Tenant Portal Work Orders are not a messaging service. If there are any questions, comments or concerns regarding the status of open work orders or the quality of the completed work order, please either call your property management office, or the Work Order Phonenumber at 603-624-2176 to speak with staff.



ROUTINE work orders are work orders the MHRA has deemed repairable within a 30-day window, these could be things such as a light bulb out, loose cabinet handles, screen repairs, etc.

Emergency work orders are considered situations such as Active Flooding, No Power, No Heat (in winter)

2. Submitting Multiple Requests

If there are multiple issues within your apartment, do not send individual requests for each one. It is okay to request multiple repairs in one online portal request.

3. Handling Emergencies

All portal requests are considered ROUTINE, if you are having an emergency please do not use the online portal to request assistance. **All Emergency Work Orders** must be called in to the phonenumber or the After Hours Emergency On Call when applicable.



All other work orders should be addressed within 48 business hours from the call.

Please Note: All calls made to the Work Order Phonenumber, even if you do not speak directly with staff, are reviewed and a work order is created when applicable. You may not always receive a call back from the Work Order Phonenumber.

The FSS Program taught me the importance of financial literacy, goal setting, and perseverance. It also helped me save money toward my future and even assisted me in pursuing my real estate license, opening doors to new career opportunities.

Today, I am proud to say that I am saving for homeownership and working toward purchasing a home for my daughter and me. For the first time in a long time, I can look forward to the future with confidence and hope.”

SUMMER REMINDERS FROM MANAGEMENT

Please help keep our communities safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone this summer.

Fire Safety

-  No fireworks allowed on MHRA property
-  No open flames (bonfires, fire pits, chimineas)
-  Grills must be at least 10 feet from any building
-  No grilling on porches or balconies

Parking Lot Safety

-  Parking lots are for vehicles — not play areas
-  Parents/guardians must supervise children at all times
-  Please drive slowly and watch for pedestrians

Being a Good Neighbor

-  Keep noise levels reasonable, especially at night
-  Residents are responsible for guests at all times
-  Be respectful to neighbors and staff

Loitering & Common Areas

-  No gathering in hallways, stairwells, or entryways
-  Keep all common areas clear and accessible
-  Dispose of trash properly — no littering or dumping

Outdoor Areas

-  No pools, water slides, tents, or temporary structures
-  Outdoor areas must be kept clean and clutter-free
-  Only outdoor furniture is allowed outside

Quick Reminders

-  Report maintenance needs promptly
-  Follow your lease and community policies
-  Contact your management office if you have questions



did you know

-  Air conditioners must be reported to the office and seasonal charges may apply
-  Avoid overloading outlets during summer months to prevent electrical hazards
-  Report leaks right away — even small ones can cause bigger issues
-  Keep windows and common doors secure to help maintain building safety
-  Warm weather can increase pests — keeping units clean helps prevent infestations

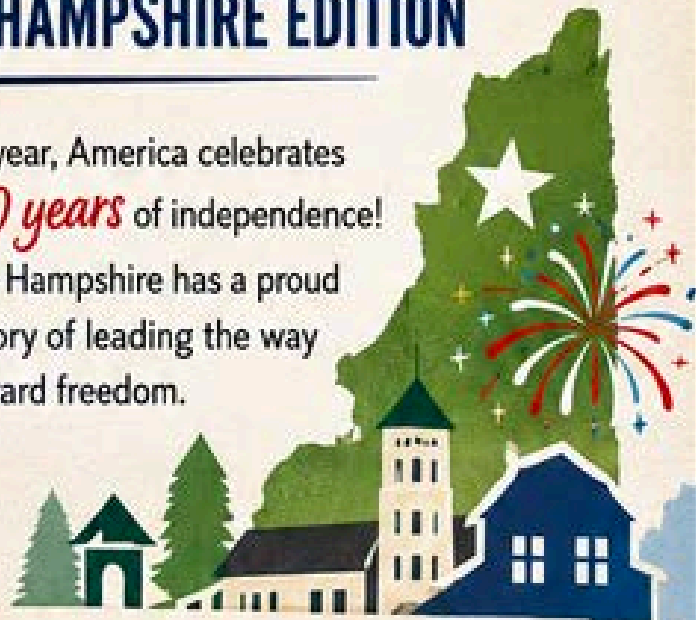

This year, America celebrates *250 years* of independence!

New Hampshire has a proud history of leading the way toward freedom.



★ NH was the **first colony** to establish as an independent government – six months before the Declaration.

★ **Three NH signers of the Declaration:** Josiah Bartlett, Matthew Thornton, and William Whipple.

★ **Over 1,000 NH soldiers** (two-thirds of the American force) fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

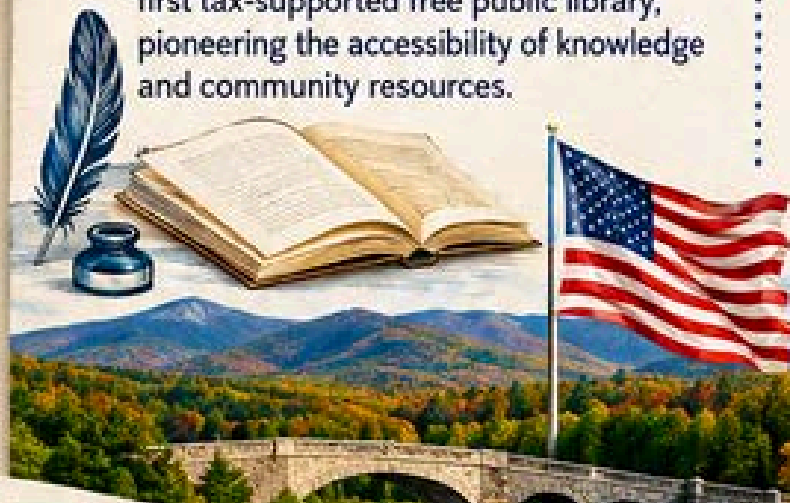
★ **1833 – 1st Free Public Library.** The town of Peterborough established the nation's first tax-supported free public library, pioneering the accessibility of knowledge and community resources.

★ **"Live Free or Die"** – General John Stark's quote – became our official state motto.

★ More than **12,000 Granite Staters** served in the Continental Army during the Revolution.

★ In 1788, NH became the **9th state to ratify the Constitution** – the decisive vote establishing our federal government.

★ **1952 – 1st in Nation Primary.** The state holds the earliest presidential primary election every cycle, cementing New Hampshire's vital role in the national political landscape.
